Psi Alpha Chapter garners Back to Back Chapter of the Year Honors



The Brothers of Psi Alpha being honored

MONROE – At the 68th Ninth District Meeting in March of 2005 in Monroe, LA the Brothers of Psi Alpha Graduate Chapter in San Antonio, Texas received the recognition as Ninth District's Graduate Chapter of the Year for 2004, the second year in a row. To perform at such a high level of excellence in consecutive years is almost unprecedented. Brother John Cooper, Basileus of Psi Alpha and a former Ninth District Omega Man of the Year, clearly understands what it takes to do the bidding of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity on a day to day basis. The chapter was engaged in a host of local, regional, and national activities with its main focus on activities in the San Antonio Metropolitan area.

The Brothers of Psi Alpha are very involved in the community. As a part of their community service they host the "Omega Forum" Public Access Television Show. This program focuses on community awareness/outreach in the San Antonio viewing area. Psi Alpha is the only Chapter in Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. to host their own TV Show. Recently they hosted its 100th episode. Under their banner "Ques-Care" and partnership with Williams Barber College, Psi Alpha offers "Ques-Cuts II" haircuts to under privileged kids for back to school, free of charge. They sponsor the "Omega Flames" YMCA Basketball Team, 11-12, age bracket that won the league championship (February 2005), Davis Scott YMCA; we also purchase uniforms and pay registration fees. The chapter makes \$2,000 annual donation to Carroll Academy Elementary School, purchase of \$750 in school supplies for students at CES, and the mentoring program at CES that includes teaching boys and girls how to play the game of chess; This school is name after a member of our Fraternity, Henry Carroll. Finally, Psi Alpha publishes a local newsletter titled "Omega Speaks"; another means to communication to our members in the local area.

However, the contributions of Psi Alpha doesn't stop there, Psi Alpha is involved in the Fiesta Chairs Scholarship Fundraiser

Project was held in April 2004 and April 2005. They were responsible for sponsoring/providing seating along the parade route for 800 people in two days; the day parade (Battle of the Flowers Parade) and the night parade (Fiesta Flambeau Parade); proceeds/over \$2,000 went towards scholarships. Psi Alpha Chapter as an official member of the San Antonio Fiesta Commission hosted its 4th Annual Fiesta Jamboree in April 2004 and its 5th Annual Fiesta Jamboree April 15th of this year to raise scholarship monies. Psi Alpha Chapter is an official member of the San Antonio Juneteenth Commission; in June 2004, we sponsored the Omega Golf Classic as a kick-off for this citywide celebration; we also participated in preparation and sale of dinner in the citywide picnic in the park; funds in excess of \$1,000 went toward the chapter's scholarship fund.

Recognition is not new to Psi Alpha, in that they were the Recipient of the 2004 San Antonio Black Achievement Award, Greek Letter Organization Category for outstanding community service and commitment to excellence. In addition, Psi Alpha Chapter took First Place in the Zeta Phi Beta Sorority Fiesta Intra-City Track Meet parade for the largest number of Greek members who participated.

The start of the success of this chapter is in their annual retreats and they recently held the 6th Annual Chapter Retreat. Psi Alpha is the only Greek Letter Organization that participates in the Black Business Exposition. As a part of the participation they host a booth and share information about our local organization, community outreach programs; home mortgage loans; internet service; telephone cards and national long distance services. Keeping the family foremost, the Brothers of Psi Alpha Chapter participated in several Quette sponsored activities to include a Valentine's Dinner and a Quette Appreciation Dinner.

These reasons and many more is why Psi Alpha Chapter was selected as the Graduate Chapter of the Year for the second consecutive year

He served as Theta Alpha Chapter Reclamation and Retention Chairman. He has been praised for his commitment to visiting senior Brothers and those who are sick and shut in. He provides updates to the Chapter on Brothers who have become unable to participate.

Brother Hinchon has attended each meeting of the Omega Life Membership Foundation while he served as Region Nine Regional Director. He served as committee chairman for the Honors and Heritage Committee and worked as a committee member on two other committees to include the Grants and Scholarships and Investment. He also served as the assistant Recording Secretary for the Executive Committee. He has attended the last sixteen Ninth District Meetings and has participated in various events throughout the district, including being the Keynote Speaker at Rho Omega Chapter Achievement week ceremony in Shreveport, LA. Brother Hinchon was the driving force behind the 1st Annual Quette Appreciation Weekend held by the Ninth District.

He has attended the Grand Conclave for the past 10 consecutive meetings. He has been active in support of other districts including being the keynote speaker at the Gamma Theta Chapter 35 year reunion in Bowling Green, Kentucky. He served as a Board Member of the Omega Life Membership Foundation and the International Retention Committee Chairman. He has attended various meetings including the International Retention Meeting, the Supreme Council Meeting and the Life Membership Foundation Board Meeting.

Brother Hinchon influence also reached the local community. He coordinated the attendance of 21 students at the Omega National Youth Leadership Conference in St. Louis, MO. He coordinated college campus visits for students at Southern Methodist University, Jarvis Christian College and Willey College. He coordinated a voter's registration drive for students in the High School.

Brother Hinchon serves as a board member with Mary McLeod Bethune Haven, Inc., an organization that provides an off campus housing facility for collegiate girls. He worked to maintain the physical property of this organization, and was commended by its director for his efforts.

Brother Hinchon is an active member of the Antioch Fellowship Missionary Baptist Church. He has demonstrated a giving and generous spirit towards the church with his finances and time. Brother Hinchon inspired the church's Greek Scholarship Ministry that raises funds that benefit the youth of the church in their pursuit of higher education. He has served as chairman of this ministry since 2002.

Brother Hinchon's contributions are many, It is for these that he was selected as the Ninth District Omega Man of the Year.



Nick A. Pittman Citizen of the Year

Brother Nick A. Pittman, Theta Alpha Chapter, was recently honored as the Ninth District Citizen of the Year. He was selected due to his numerous civic contributions. In fiscal year 2003-2004, Brother Pittman demonstrated an astonishing ability to commit and lend himself in service to the North Texas Area (Dallas / Fort Worth Metroplex) community.

He served as Chairman of the J.L. Turner Legal Association Foundation. While in this capacity he was instrumental in raising over \$350,000 and providing scholarships to college students who want to attend law school and who are committed to using their law degrees to help those who can't afford to pay for legal representation. In addition, through his leadership this foundation has been instrumental in providing pro bono legal services to minorities who are in need of lawyers.

Brother Pittman also served as Chairman of the CAAPCO Foundation (the Coalition of African American Professional and Community Organizations). He started the Career Exposure Forum and College Fair. This is part of a partnership with Dallas Independent School District, the various Chambers of Commerce and dozens of other community service organizations. The Career Exposure Forum takes place at the Dallas Convention Center and in 2004 served over five thousand eight through twelve graders each year. It also brings in representatives from over 200 colleges and over 1,000 career professionals. The goal of the Forum and Fair is to expose students, many of them minorities, to the wide variety of career paths open to them and to encourage them to attend colleges or trade schools. The event has also provided scholarship assistance to students in financial need.

As Chairman of CAAPCO he serves on the Superintendent's Advisory Committee for the DISD superintendent, advising on ways to increase community and parental involvement in the lives of our minority youth. Under his leadership there have been various economic development programs implemented that are designed to help the economic development initiatives in the African American Community, including a partnership with Black Enterprise Magazine on economic development and entrepreneurial seminars.

Brother Pittman serves as a member of the Board of Governors of the Dallas Symphony Association. He has been active in the fundraising efforts for the African-American and Hispanic Festival Concerts. These free concerts are designed to expose minorities to different forms of music, such as classical and jazz.

Brother Pittman is a member of the International Order of Barristers. He was chosen by the Chief Federal Judge in the Northern District of Texas to serve on the Court Advisory Committee and the Magistrate Selection Committee. Finally, he was selected as a "Super Lawyer" in 2003 and 2004 by the nationally acclaimed "Law and Politics" Magazine and the Texas Law Journal and was one of only a handful of lawyers chosen in more than one area.

Brother Pittman has been and is still very active in the community. It is for these contributions that he was selected Ninth District Citizen of the Year.



Omega Psi Phi Day at the Oklahoma Capital

Brothers were instructed to meet with their individual Representatives or Senators to let them know what we were doing and why we were there at the Capital. After the tours and visits were concluded Brothers again assembled before leaving for the frat house.

Brother Jesse Jones presented the resolution and the Brothers to the House.

From the House the Brothers moved to the Senate where the Senate acknowledged the Fraternity, Brother Senator Royce West read the Resolution, and the Brothers were recognized in the gallery and on the floor of the Senate. Also, present for the resolution presentation was the Lieutenant Governor of Texas. Brothers went from the Senate to the steps of the Capitol for pictures and from there went to lunch in the Capitol's cafeteria. Following lunch, many Brothers went to meet with their respective legislators or just tour the Capitol building.

The Mighty Ninth is breaking new ground with the Omega Days and is setting the standards for what African American men should be doing. Despite the successes of these Omega Days, we are reminded of our duty to Omega and to our communities, to serve. Omega must not stop but keep vigilant and active in our service to Omega and to "improving the lives of Black people."

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Salute to Dr. Hooks

Slidell, Louisiana. On 23 March 2005, the Chi Kappa Kappa Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. was

invited to participate in a ribbon cutting ceremony for the Carville Job Corps Academy - American Petroleum Institute for Oilfield Training Program. The Job Corps is a branch of the US Department of Labor, which has a mission to provide eligible young adults with life skills, education, and career trades that will make them highly employable, independent and competitive within the workforce industry. The Carville Job Corps Academy currently serves approximately three hundred students. Chi Kappa Kappa is seeking to foster a positive mentor program at the Carville Job Corps Academy.

One of our "Famous Omega Men," Brother Dr. Benjamin L. Hooks, happen to serve as a featured speakers for the ribbon cutting ceremony. Dr. Hooks presently serves as President on the Board of Directors for Minact, Inc. He served as Executive Director of the NAACP for 15 years. Hooks joined civil rights activist and reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. Southern Christian Leadership Conference. An ordained Baptist minister, Hooks suggest that family unity is essential if black people are to partake of the American dream. He told the Arizona Republic that the solution to the current crisis in black America may lie in "a return to the kind of family values" - the conventional nuclear family structure of gainfully employed parents- "expressed in Southern Baptist morality."

The Island Bruhs Clean The Beach!

Galveston, TX – On April 23, 2005 the men of Rho Nu Chapter, along with friends and family, took part in the Texas

General Land Office's Annual Adopt-A-Beach Spring Cleanup. During the year, trash is left on the beach by visitors, or washes ashore from the Gulf of Mexico. To combat this problem, the Brothers descended upon R.A. Apffel Park, which is located on the east end of Galveston Island, to clear the beach of all trash and debris. The beach cleanup is done bi-annually, and has been in existence since 1986. Since its inception, more than 321,000 volunteers have removed 6,100 tons of trash from Texas beaches. 


Fraternity members from Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas are holding their convention, usually reserved for larger venues, in Monroe for the first time.



Brother Harold Erwin Abney



Brother Harold Erwin Abney, a Hawkins, Texas resident, entered Omega Chapter on Tuesday, March 29, 2005. He was a longtime member of Sigma Omicron Chapter of Tyler, Texas. During his graduate brotherhood connection, he held the office of Keeper of Finance and was very active in the fraternity's memorial service and programs. Two in which he took a special interest were "Christmas Cheer" and "Boys to Men". The Christmas Cheer annual event serves the community by providing food, clothing, and fellowship to needy families. Boys to Men is a program that works to enhance the knowledge of young males so that they may grasp a better understanding of their culture and problems that may be faced within that culture.

Harold Abney was born April 30, 1951 in Texarkana, Arkansas. Many considered him a "whiz kid" because he was a very bright youngster. Described by those who knew him at an early age as an astute, polite, obedient (yet mischievous) loving and gentle soul was Harold. These traits followed him throughout his life. He was an outgoing person that loved a challenge and never met one that he did not conquer. Actively involved in his community throughout his life, he served as a disc jockey on KADO FM in Texarkana and KEEE AM in Nacogdoches. In addition, he acted as Master of Ceremony for many community affairs.

His public schooling began at Sunset Elementary, continued to Dunbar High School, and culminated with a 1969 graduation from Texas High in Texarkana, Texas. He journeyed to Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches, Texas and earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in business administration and political science. While pursuing his

undergraduate degree at SFA, Harold Abney became a charter member of the collegiate chapter, Omega Beta, in March of 1972.

Professionally, Brother Abney was a Financial Aid Director at Jarvis Christian College, president of Hawkins Independent School District Board of Trustees, a member of Rotary International and affiliated with numerous other civic and professional organizations. Also, he was a member of New Zion Baptist Church, where he was president of the church board and a Sunday school teacher.

An icon of inner strength, will power, and fortitude, Brother Harold Erwin Abney possessed and exhibited all the principles of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. and therefore will be remembered by those he touched as a beacon of light for the brotherhood.

Survivors include his wife Zula R. Funeral services were held Saturday, April 2, 2005 at Jarvis Christian College in the Smith-Howard Chapel with Rev. Jesse Gooden officiating. Chapter members of Sigma Sigma and Phi Beta served as honor guards during the final tribute under the supervision of Brother Bobby Stinson, the East Texas State Representative. Brother Abney was laid to rest in Chapelwood Memorial Gardens under direction of Haynes Mortuary.
